Bruce B. Dan, MD: Chairman, Medical Advisory Board and Ethics Legal Regulatory Review Board

Dr. Dan received his B.S. from MIT, his M.D. from Vanderbilt University School of Medicine, and completed his internship, residency, and post-doctoral fellowship in infectious diseases at the Vanderbilt Medical Center.

He was a member of the U.S. Epidemic Intelligence Service in the Hospital Infections Branch at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Dr. Dan was awarded the AMA's Morris Fishbein Fellowship in Medical Journalism and was the Senior Editor of the Journal of the American Medical Association and Director of the AMA's Department of Scientific and Clinical Affairs. He was Medical Editor and on-air correspondent for ABC News, Chicago (WLS-TV), Founding Medical Editor and Anchor for American Medical Television on CNBC, Resident Physician for HealthWeek on PBS, and Senior Medical Consultant for WebMD.

Dr. Dan has won two Emmy awards for his work in television, and was the recipient of the University of Chicago's William Benton Fellowship in Broadcast Journalism. The American Medical Writers Association's has honored him with the John P. McGovern Award for outstanding contributions to medical communications.

Eileen T. Breslin, PhD, RN

Dean of the School of Nursing, University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio



Dr. Breslin received her bachelor's degree from Northern Arizona University. She obtained her Master's degree from the University of Arizona in Tucson, and her Ph.D. from the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center in Denver.

Dr. Breslin rose through the ranks at Northern Arizona University becoming a full-tenured Professor and Chair of the Department of Nursing before moving to the University of Massachusetts – Amherst to serve as Dean of the School of Nursing and also hold the position of Interim Dean for the School of Public Health & Health Sciences.

Dr. Breslin is a Distinguished Practitioner in Nursing in the National Academies of Practice and a Fellow in the American Academy of Nurse Practitioners. She was appointed by DHHS Secretary Tommy Thompson to serve on the National Advisory Council for Nursing Education and Practice. She served on the Boards of the American Association of Colleges of Nursing and the Massachusetts Organization of Nurse Executives.

Colleen Conway-Welch, PhD, CNM, FAAN, FACNM

Nancy & Hilliard Travis Professor of Nursing and Dean, Vanderbilt University School of Nursing



Dr. Colleen Conway-Welch has been active in nursing practice and nursing education for over four decades. Dr. Conway-Welch is a graduate of Georgetown University, Catholic University of America, and New York University.

She has served on President Reagan's Commission on the HIV Epidemic in 1988, the National Bipartisan Commission on the Future of Medicare in 1998, and is a member of the National Academy of Sciences Institute of Medicine. In 2002, she was appointed by DHHS Secretary Tommy Thompson to the Secretary's Council on Public Health Preparedness, Office of the Assistant Secretary for Public Health Emergency Preparedness, and in 2006, was named by President Bush and confirmed by the U.S. Senate as a Member of the Board of Regents of the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences; the premier graduate education program for military health care providers. She was appointed by Secretary Leavitt of DHHS to the Advisory Committee to the Director of the National Institutes of Health 2007.

Vincent A. Fulginiti MD

Chancellor Emeritus and Emeritus Professor of Pediatrics, University of Colorado Health Sciences Center



Dr. Fulginiti received his BS, MSc, and MD degrees from Temple University. He was the founding Department Head of Pediatrics at the new medical school at the University of Arizona, remaining in that position for the next 16 years. He then successively became Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and Acting Dean at that institution.

Dr. Fulginiti was the Dean of the School of Medicine at Tulane University in New Orleans, and later Chancellor of the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center. He was Editor of the American Journal of Diseases of Children for more than 10 years as well as a member of the Editorial Advisory Board of the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Dr. Fulginiti's interests have encompassed health professional education; general pediatrics; pediatric infectious diseases, immunization and immunology; medical curriculum; health care ethics; faculty development; and various levels of health science administration and leadership.

William R. Hendee, PhD

Distinguished Professor of Biophysics, Radiology, Radiation Oncology, and Population Health, Medical College of Wisconsin; Professor of Biomedical Engineering, Marquette University; Adjunct Professor of Electrical Engineering, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee; Clinical Professor of Radiology, University of New Mexico



Dr. Hendee received a BS degree from Millsaps College and a PhD in physics from the University of Texas. He served as Assistant and Associate Professor and Chairman of Physics and Astronomy at Millsaps College, before joining the faculty of the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center serving as Professor and Chairman of the Department of Radiology.

Dr. Hendee then joined the staff of the American Medical Association as Vice President for Science and Technology holding appointments as Adjunct Professor of Radiology at Northwestern University School of Medicine and Clinical Professor of Radiology and Biophysics at the Medical College of Wisconsin. He joined the faculty of the Medical College of Wisconsin as Senior Associate Dean and Vice President with faculty appointments as professor and vice chair of radiology with professorships in biophysics, radiation oncology and bioethics, and also holding a professorship in bioengineering at Marquette University later assuming additional responsibilities as Dean of the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences at the Medical College of Wisconsin and subsequently serving as Acting Executive Vice President and Dean of the Medical College, and Professor and Chair of Radiology, University of Colorado

Phil Lieberman, M.D.

Clinical Professor of Medicine and Pediatrics in the Departments of Internal Medicine and Pediatrics (Divisions of Allergy and Immunology) of Tennessee - College of Medicine, Memphis, Tennessee.



Dr. Lieberman graduated from Tulane University and received his MD degree from the University of Tennessee College of Medicine, completing his residency in Internal Medicine there before being appointed Chief Resident at the City of Memphis Hospital, and receiving his Allergy/Immunology Fellowship training at Northwestern University.

Dr. Lieberman was the Professor and Chief of the Division of Allergy and Immunology at the University of Tennessee. He is the former president of the American Academy of Allergy, Asthma and Immunology, and the American Association of Certified Allergists. Dr. Lieberman also served on the Board of Directors of the American Board of Allergy and Immunology.

He is the author of over 225 scientific publications and is co-editor of the text *Allergic Diseases*. Dr. Lieberman's present investigative interests are in the fields of asthma and anaphylaxis.

Robert H. Moser, M.D., M.A.C.P.

Dr. Moser received his MD degree from Georgetown University and began his military career later becoming the Chief of the Department of Medicine at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center. President, Regulatory Services and Healthcare, APCO Worldwide; consultant

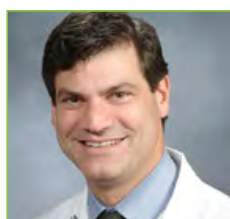
